Monday, 30 June - Tuesday, 1 July 2025

Seven years after the adoption of UNDROP by the General Assembly of the United Nations, here at the World Organic Forum we identified the following key challenges, chances and questions to follow-up and to make the United Nations Declaration on the Rights of Peasants and Other People Working in Rural Areas to unfold its potential:

👉 we need to overcome the neglect of rural areas in public debates!

👉 the most marginalised people in rural areas need to be included into our movements for establishing UNDROP in daily realities!

🤝 the rights and values being reflected in UNDROP need to be achieved and realized locally by various forms of community and civil society engagement, being adjusted to the high diversity of local contexts around the globe!

👉 civil societies need to enhance the pressure on their governments for establishing the rights of peasants, farmers and of other people working in rural areas!

🌍 the relevance of climate change must be permanently considered in the context of UNDROP!

📖 how to put more strength to our arguments (via scientific data, more research, socio-cultural knowledge and education)?

🤝 how to include topics regarding markets and marketing as well as market access as one key factor for establishing UNDROP in the field?

♥ UNDROP offers a powerful framework for a non-violent revolution through the approaches of inclusiveness and agroecology!

👊 defending the right to food is defending the right of everybody!

🌐 all together in our partnerships and alliances around the globe, we have the power and the potential to strengthen activities for UNDROP as a global network!
